- **A Report from Len Bigaj:** Project Healing Waters will be at the V.A. on April 9th, from 6pm to 8pm. As for the next show, it will be in August.
- **Wiscony Diary Program:** During 2009, the DEC Region 9 Fisheries Office will be running an angler diary program for Wiscony Creek in Allegany and Wyoming Counties and is currently looking for anglers to keep diaries. If you fish Wiscony Creek (even once) and would like to keep a diary for DEC, please call the DEC Fisheries Office at (716) 372-0645 or e-mail at fwfish9@gw.dec.state.ny.us. The program will run March 1st through October 31st. This program duplicates one run in 2006 and will be used in conjunction with a late-summer electrofishing survey to evaluate the fishery's overall quality. In 2006, over 115 anglers signed up for the program.
- **Charles Arrick Youth Raffle (by Dee Maciejewski):** Do you know a young person who is a beginner at fishing and would like to try fly fishing? At our June 30th meeting, we will hold our Second Annual Youth Raffle. Last year, Charles Arrick, one of WNYTU's original members, donated his fly fishing equipment to us, with the stipulation that young beginner fly fishers would be the recipients. This year, we have decided to continue the "tradition" and have named the event for Mr. Arrick, who recently passed away. His wife has graciously donated money for this year's raffle, and there will be an assortment of prizes for the lucky winners. - **New York State Council of Trout Unlimited "Trout Waters" Youth Camp:** Gary Coons called my attention to the "Trout Waters" experience for young people, ages 14 to 17. This Trout Unlimited youth camp will be held from July 19 to 25 at the Vikings Resort property near the West Branch of the Delaware. Topics include fly fishing, entomology, ecology, and conservation. brochure, which includes an application. Please note that the application deadline for this wonderful opportunity is APRIL 15.

- **DEC Summer Youth Camps:** For more great youth oriented conservation-related opportunities, please keep in mind the DEC Summer Environmental Education Camps. These include “Camp Colby”, near Saranac Lake in the northern Adirondacks; “Pack Forest”, north of Warrensburg in the southern Adirondacks; “Camp DeBruce”, located in the southern Catskills; and “Camp Rushford”, right here in our “backyard” at the Hanging Bog Wildlife Management Area. Also, the DEC has a program to help low income youngsters make the experience more affordable. Information on the scholarship can be obtained from the DEC Region 9 office.

The goal of this program is to introduce young people to cold water conservation and to fly fishing. There are all sorts of benefits to motivating youngsters to care about the natural world and to participate actively in it. “Conserving, protecting, and restoring” our coldwater fisheries is a splendid medium for channeling these activities. Please take a look at TU’s youth initiative and see what you can do to introduce a child to the fishing and conservation pursuits we all value so much.
- **News from the North Country:** Just in time for Jim (“Adirondack”) Zak’s presentation at our upcoming chapter meeting, here are some items from the Adirondack region.

 - David Barus has alerted us to a report on acid rain damage to Western Adirondack streams. We are already familiar with the impact of acid rain on Adirondack lakes, but this report describes the findings with respect to streams. Unfortunately, the news is not good. Streams are less able than are lakes to dilute the effects of acid rain in general and episodic pulses of acidity, in particular. “Salvation at Oak Orchard” by Al Himmel

My friend, Mark Stothard, one of the most remarkable fishermen I have ever met, lived at the top of the hill, at the end of Park Avenue in Waterport, near Medina, N.Y. Oak Orchard Creek is one of the very best tributary streams around for salmon and steelhead fishing, so my venture to its waters was inevitable. Meeting Mark was an added attractant. Mark taught me how to find the resting steelhead and to cast weighted flies behind the spawning salmon so that hook ups became almost routine. Mark, who designed the carpet fly, invited me to his ramshackle den and taught me his method of tying those very successful flies. To my amazement, his den was adorned with paintings he had done, rods he had built, and even a guitar he had carved and assembled. His talents were infinite; and we became good friends until the day he moved to Bath, in order to be near his daughter, who needed weekly dialysis treatments. Unfortunately, Mark died of cancer soon thereafter.

The climb up and down the hill soon became unbearable for an octogenarian, so my visits to Oak Orchard became few and far between. That is, they did so until last year, when I stopped at the Archery Club to purchase a hot dog. I found that I could park behind the club for a five dollar donation. Wow, did that ever change my activities at Oak Orchard! I now could drive down the dirt road, park the car, jump into my habit and fish in a matter of minutes, all without the exhaustion generated by the uphill climb. Additionally, the dogs, pop and coffee were subject only to an optional donation to the fish bowl receptacle. Included in the bargain is the distinct possibility of hooking a relative of the twenty-four inch brown now mounted on my den wall. Try it; you may find paradise.
